

How Safe Families Differs from Foster Care?

Safe Families for Children (SFFC) and the foster care system both work with a population of vulnerable children and families. The primary difference is that Safe Families seeks to walk with parents before and/or during moments of crisis to prevent child abuse and neglect. Through prevention efforts, Safe Families hopes to deflect more children from having to enter the foster care system unnecessarily. Our goal is to support, stabilize, strengthen parents through ongoing supportive relationships and resources so children can stay safe and families together.

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Keeps kids safe during a time of crisis before child abuse and/or neglect occurs

Parents voluntarily request a hosting or family friending so they can have time and support to get back on their feet

Parents maintain custody of their children

Hostings are short-term, with an average about 30 days; but can be as short as just a night or two

Safe Families volunteers build caring, compassionate relationships with the parent to help achieve target goals.

Safe Families volunteers are recruited from and organized through local churches

The goal is family reunification...98% of children hosted return to their families

Host Families get no compensation, but get support through a network of volunteers

One hosting costs an average of \$1,500 to the Safe Families Chapter

FOSTER CARE

Removes children from their families after the abuse has occurred

Parents have no choice in the removal of their children

Parents lose custody of their children

Foster care placements often end up being long-term, often with no clear ending.

Children are in foster care for an average of 2.5 years

Foster care focuses on the safety of the child and deep friendships between foster parents and biological parents are not often encouraged

Foster families are recruited from the general population and are licensed through social service agencies

Nationally, less than half of kids in foster care return to their families; some states and counties have lower percentages

Foster Parents are monetarily compensated by the government

One child in foster care costs at least \$35,000-\$40,000 a year to the state.
